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PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you (Matthew 6:33 KJV).

In his book, <u>Dedication and Leadership</u>, Douglas Hyde gives us an interesting contrast between the demands of atheistic Communism and Christianity. From his early days as a Communist, Hyde tells us that the Party appealed to recruits, because of the sacrifice and commitment that they saw in those already in the Communist Party.

The Party knew that it was bad psychology to ask for low commitment or small sacrifices. New members were expected to devote all of themselves to the Communist movement for life's meaning even dying for the cause, and that is the only example that they saw from fellow members. The ends justify wrong means.

Unfortunately, Communism takes good men with good intentions and uses them for a bad cause. Because its approaches to God, the nature of man, and the world, Communism starts off on the wrong foot. consequences are that the men, who join the party, start out to be saviors, and instead become men's abusers. It is Christianity that a gives the better world.

As Lent begins, realize that by comparison, Hyde says that the Church often asks very little of Christians. We have the amazing Good News of the Creator God's love and acceptance, and it is a message worth devoting one's life. Unfortunately, we often seem afraid to ask people to make major devotions or to live sacrificial lives. Hyde notes that such a lukewarm Christianity won't grip the watching world's minds and hearts.

We forget that our God is alive and active in the world. God is never satisfied with being second or third in our priorities. God wants us to live a lifestyle that is more than abundant in quality. This can only happen if we are willing to surrender ourselves with all abandon. God calls us to devote ourselves by full obedience to His commands so that we can readily receive the fullness of His love as His children. We position ourselves by seeking after Him with our whole heart. Seeking God without limitation unleashes us into the full blessings that naturally flow from His presence.

When we seek God, our desire for Him grows. We become more dependent on who God is, not what He can give us. We become nourished by His love and realize He created us, and He alone is our fulfillment.

The more we know our merciful God, the more we see how infinite He is. His ways are right and important to live by for the true well-being for us and others. Those who have studied the Bible, have spent much time seeking God and acquiring a rich relationship with Him. Our relationship with God goes as deep and as close as we allow it. God gives the invitation for intimacy and waits for us to pursue relationship with Him.

God does not keep anything good from us. As it has been said, He gave His one and only Son to die for us to take the punishment for our sins; that is the ultimate gift. So, why would He keep anything from us that would obviously be less valuable? This Lent, let us ponder James 4:8, "Draw near to God, and He will draw near to you."

Ash Wednesday and the Journey of Lent

The forty days of Lent that begin on Ash Wednesday

self-examination. purification, and closer journey with God. Many Christians adopt a spiritual discipline for the forty days, including fasting from certain foods or adding spiritual study and reading to their daily schedules.

The forty days of Lent remind us of the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness after his

baptism, fasting and being tempted by Satan (Matthew 4:1-11; Mark 1:12-13; Luke 4:1-13), as well as the forty days that Moses spent in spiritual questing on Mt. Sinai (Exodus 24:18). There is also the spiritual legacy of the forty years that the Israelites spent wandering in the

desert after their release from slavery in Egypt (<u>Deuteronomy 8:2-4</u>). All of these scriptural traditions give us a heritage of spiritual questing through prayer and self-discipline.

The Lenten journey begins with Ash Wednesday, the day on which worshipers' foreheads are marked with a cross of the dark ash of palms (often palms used in the previous year's Palm Sunday observances) as a sign of penitence and mourning and as a foretaste of the death that is to come on Good Friday.

Were You There?

This anonymous written plantation spiritual hymn asks the listener to imagine him or herself at Jesus's crucifixion. Such an inventive move is particularly compelling for oppressed people, such as the American slaves who traditionally sang this song, who are thus reminded that Jesus has experienced terrible suffering and understands their pain.



The repetition of lines allows for ease of communal singing; when combined with the song's slow, somber melody, this repetition also gives the spiritual a meditative quality.

Note the physical response to the spiritual contemplation; picturing oneself at the scene of the crucifixion leads one to "tremble, tremble, tremble."

A New Lifestyle

Repentance means establishing new priorities dependent on God's purpose for our lives.

A man lost his job in the great depression of the thirties. His savings were quickly gone. He and his wife lost their home. His grief was multiplied when she died quite suddenly. The only thing he had left was his faith, and it was weakening.

One day when he was out looking for work, he stopped to watch some men who were doing the stonework on a church building. One of those men was skillfully chiseling a triangular piece of rock. Not seeing the spot where it would fit, he asked, "Where are you going to put that?"

Group Prayer

The apostles learned their leadership patterns from the Master, Jesus Christ. Scan the Gospels for Jesus' teaching and practice of prayer, and you will identify 37 verses, sometimes repeated in more than one Gospel. Of those 37 instances in which Jesus refers to prayer, 33 of them were addressed to a plural rather than singular audience. In other words, Jesus' instruction decisively leaned toward praying with others, not just praying in private.

The Book of Acts records the mighty works of God for and through His church in its early years, and clearly connects them to unified, corporate prayer. The 120 were gathered in an upper room praying in one accord when the Holy Spirit comes (Acts 1:13; 2:1).

The disciples prayed for wisdom in knowing who Judas' replacement should be (Acts 1:24).

When Peter and John reported the Sanhedrin's threats, those gathered cried out to God in one accord for boldness, and the place was shaken where they prayed (Acts 4:24, 31).

The church prayed over the seven men appointed to serve the widows (Acts 6:6).

After James was martyred and Peter imprisoned by Herod, the church was fervently praying, and God miraculously delivered Peter from his cell (Acts 12:1-11).

While the prophets and teachers were praying and fasting, the Holy Spirit called Paul and Barnabas to go on their first missionary journey (Acts 13:1-2). Paul and Silas were praying when God sent an earthquake that resulted in the conversion of the jailer and their release (Acts 16:25).

Let us not disparage personal, private prayer. Ananias was praying alone when God instructed him to go to Saul (Acts 9:10ff.). Peter was alone on the rooftop when he had his famous vision leading him to share the Gospel with a Gentile named Cornelius (Acts 10:9ff.). Nevertheless, the majority of God's recorded workings came when His people prayed together.

There are so many examples of how corporate prayer was the springboard for the sweeping movements of God. Let me mention a few. In 1857, America was riding the wave of a strong economy, and, as tends to be true in times of prosperity, showed a radical decrease of interest in the things of God. There was a layman named Jeremiah Lamphier whose concern led to a call for prayer. He tacked up notices in New York City calling for a weekly prayer meeting on Wednesdays from noon till one at a rented space on Fulton Street.

The first prayer meeting was on September 23, 1857. Only six people came, and they didn't arrive until just before 12:30. The next week, the attendance jumped to 20. The numbers continued to climb week-by-week.

Then, on October 10th, the Stock Market crashed and financial panic ensued. Trouble had its humbling affect, and the hearts of many turned to spiritual matters. It wasn't long until somewhere between 10 and 50,000 businessmen were meeting every day in NYC to pray at noon. By week 15, the meetings moved from weekly to daily.

In 1858, this prayer movement leaped to every major city in America. The Second Great Awakening swept our land. Estimates are that a million Americans out of a population of 30 million at that time were converted in less than two years. And it all started with prayer.

Rees Howells, a Welsh coal miner, journeyed to South Africa as a missionary in 1910 in response to an increasing burden from the Lord. Six weeks after arriving, he joined in a prayer meeting. Out of that came the sweeping work of the Holy Spirit in which they had two revival meetings a day for fifteen months and all day on Friday. Thousands were converted as a result.

You can find story after story of how corporate prayer became the springboard for the mighty movement of God. Right now, the Gospel is sweeping the globe at a rate that is unimaginable. The missionary, Avery Willis, has reported that statistically, most of the people who have ever been saved in history were saved during the 20th Century. Willis suggested as high as 70 percent of the total number of people who have been saved throughout world history have come to Christ in the last hundred years.

But get this: 70 percent of that number has been saved since 1945! Let me boggle your mind with one other layer of observation from this world missions expert: 70 percent of those saved since 1945 were saved since

1990! That's how fast the Gospel is storming our world. That means that at the turn of the 21st Century, possibly one-third of all Christians who have ever lived have been converted since 1990!



What does that look like? ln Nepal, just 2000 Christians were known in 1990; ten years later that number had grown to half a million. Cambodia claimed only 600 believers in 1990; there is a reported 60,000 today. In

Korea during the 20th Century, the country advanced from being 2 percent Christian to about 40 percent Christian today.

East Africa is experiencing one of the greatest movements of God in history. In Uganda alone, HIV/AIDS once claimed the lives of one-third of the population. The World Health Organization predicted the complete collapse of the Ugandan economy by the year 2000. But revival has come to that country. With the salvation of many has come a transformation in morals, so that AIDS is down to 5 percent. So great is this revival that one church alone went from 7 in attendance to an average of 2000 in just two weeks! Currently, that same church as a membership of 22,000 and has planted 150 other churches.

In almost every quarter of the globe, Christianity is advancing...except for four primary areas: North America, Japan, Australia, and Western Europe. Guess what one of the common denominators is everywhere Christianity marches forward? Christians spend time in prayer together.
