“God’s Unfailing Presence” Esther 7:1-6, 9-10; 9:20-22

Power can be abused. Could Queen Esther have ever wondered where is God when her life began to crumble, and her burdens were overwhelming? Gaining perspective, Esther has not gone to the king to seek an exception for herself; nor is she only the spokesperson for her people. She has merged her identity—and destiny—with theirs. “My people and I have been sold for destruction,” she says, and then continues by using the word “we.” Mordecai’s questions in 4:13–14 appear to have brought about some soul-searching in the young Jewess. Courage and loyalty have replaced timidity and self-protection.

TEACHING POINTS

POINT ONE – Power can be corrupting.

POINT TWO – We might wonder where God is when life crumbles.

POINT THREE – We can develop courage when we remember God’s unfailing presence.

THIS WEEK’S KEY PASSAGE

³ Queen Esther replied, “If I have found favor with the king, and if it pleases the king to grant my request, I ask that my life and the lives of my people will be spared. (*Esther 7:3 NLT*).

ACTION POINT

The king was furious, and that was the end of Haman. Who would become the next prime minister? Who else? The irony of ironies - it was Mordecai. As for the decree about killing the Jews on the thirteenth of Adar, that could not be changed - a royal decree is irrevocable even by the royal who decreed it. But a second decree was issued allowing Jews to defend themselves against any attack. That was enough to prevent the Holocaust. To this day, the Jewish people remember the treachery of Haman, the wisdom of Mordecai, and the bravery of Esther in the annual joyful celebration of Purim. Where was God in all that? While God is never mentioned in the narrative, the story turned out all right, evil was defeated, and justice triumphed. What can we conclude, but that God was there all the time, making things come out right? Why not turn your cares over to the God who is in charge and who loves you!

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
