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"It Is Well With My Soul" Job 1:1, 2:1-10
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October 7, 2018

Rarely does the Bible part the curtains so that the reader can catch a glimpse of what is happening behind the scenes of human history. So, here is a man who had it all--health, wealth, family, friends--all the things that most people treasure, and yet he lost it all. Can you relate to that? His wife asks, "Are you still holding on to your integrity? Curse God and die!" However, he does hold on to his integrity--and he holds on to his faith in God. How did he do it? It is a story we see time and time again. The person who trusts in God experiences great heartache but, somehow, he or she comes through that heartache with more faith and not less.

TEACHING POINTS

POINT ONE – Adversity is an experience that runs throughout human history.

POINT TWO – After we have had a painful human experience, we ought to get from that experience everything it has to teach us.

POINT THREE –Greater than the reality of evil is the goodness and mercy of God that underlies our lives. "God is good, all the time. All the time, God is good."

THIS WEEK'S KEY PASSAGE

There once was a man named Job who lived in the land of Uz. He was blameless—a man of complete integrity. He feared God and stayed away from evil (Job 1:1 NLT).

ACTION POINT

As we study the Book of Job together over these next four Lectionary weeks, we will find the answer to how people cling to their faith. In Their Own Words, by Col. William Francis, describes Dietrich Bonhoeffer as a Protestant pastor who was arrested, imprisoned and later executed by the Nazis during World War II. From his lonely prison cell, Bonhoeffer wrote letters full of faith and hope. Here is a quote from one letter to his sister: "I think that God is nearer to suffering than to happiness, and to find God in this way gives peace and rest and a strong and courageous heart." Curse God and die? No. Trust God and live! That is the testimony of thousands of people through the ages who have experienced the trials of Job. Will, you not also trust God and live.

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
