## **PASTOR'S THOUGHTS**

<sup>40</sup> For it is my Father's will that all who see his Son and believe in Him should have eternal life. I will raise them up at the last day" (John 6:40 NLT).

When I was four years old, I remember asking my dad if he believed in God. He came from a religious childhood background, but I later surmised that he lost his faith during the bloody World War II fighting as a Marine fighting to protect our American way of life.

Right after Pearl Harbor during the patriotic fervor and right out of high school, he signed up with the Marine Corp outfit that would "get the most action." And they did. He repetitiously embarked on first wave island landings in the Pacific. Unfortunately, he wasn't wellanchored in the Word of God. Right away, he had seen and experienced too much terror at an early age that had broken many men with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. The young soldiers were seeing the worse of life.

This world can be a horrendously, cruel, and inhumane place. It can also be a place of crimes, betrayals, and disappointments too much for the strongest to handle. We must hold everything loosely in this world; we don't know when it will be taken away. Unless we get our bearings straight by anchoring our faith, security, and trust foremost in God, we can also lose our direction in this world.

This world is not the way God desired for it to be. The Good News is that God promises to remake this world into one where it is described in Revelation 21:4, "He will wipe **every tear** from their eyes, and there will be no more death or sorrow or crying or pain. All these things are gone forever." That's what we all really want; isn't it?

What hadn't dawned on my dad was that Jesus came as a person so that people could see God for the first time. Jesus did only what the Father wanted Him to do. Jesus told His disciples that if they had seen Him, they had seen the Father. Read about Jesus; He was the most loving and merciful person who ever lived.

Or look at it this way; God understands everything we can go through from minor things to even being mocked, tortured, and sacrificed on a cross. This is because He also lived through it. Jesus came to earth during the cruel Roman occupation of Israel and was born to a family in extreme poverty. He could have come as a king, but He didn't. God understands our circumstances. He came to die for sinners to pay the price to make them right with God.

If you wonder why your faith is weak, it is because you need to look to Christ for fulfillment and to anchor your life. This world cannot satisfy us. Jesus called Himself the "Bread of Life." He wants us to feast on knowing Him deeper every day. Independence Day: Our Christian Heritage



For 235 years, America has been blessed as the longest on-going Constitutional Republic in the history of the world. These blessings are not accidental they are blessings of God. This is evident as we look at the turmoil in other nations and contrast that to the stability we see in America. Preserving American liberty depends first upon our understanding of the foundations on which this great country was built, and then it depends on preserving the principles on which it was founded.

On July 2, 1776, Congress voted to approve a complete separation from England. Two days later, the early draft of the Declaration of Independence was signed. Four days later, members of Congress took the document and read it out loud from the steps of Independence Hall, proclaiming it to the city of Philadelphia, and afterwards they rang the Liberty Bell. The inscription on the top of the bell is Leviticus 25:10, which reads, "Proclaim liberty throughout the land and to all the inhabitants thereof."

John Adams said, "The general principles on which the Fathers achieved independence were the general principles of Christianity." Probably the clearest identification of the spirit of the American Revolution was given by John in a letter to Abigail the day after Congress approved the Declaration. He wrote her two letters that day: One was short and jubilant that the Declaration had been approved; the other letter was much longer and gave serious consideration to what had been done that day. Adams could already foresee that their actions would be celebrated by future generations.

Adams also noted: "This day will be the most memorable epic in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival." He felt the celebration should be in a manner that would commemorate the day as a "day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty." John Adams believed that the Fourth of July should be a religious holiday. The two top holidays celebrated in this country are Christmas and the Fourth of July. According to John Quincy Adams, the two dates are connected. On the Fourth of July, the Founding Fathers simply took the precepts of Christ and His birth (Christmas) and incorporated those principles into civil government.

The Declaration of Independence was the birth certificate for this nation, but the men who signed it knew it could be their death warrant. The closing paragraph states, "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance of the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor." The 56 Founding Fathers, 27 of whom were trained as ministers, took their pledge seriously. On the morning of the signing, there was silence and gloom as each man was called up to the table of the President of

Congress to sign the document, knowing that it could mean their death by hanging.

Most wars have a motto. The motto of World War II was "Remember Pearl Harbor." The motto during the Texas war for independence was "Remember the Alamo." The spiritual emphasis, directed towards King George III who violated Gods laws, gave rise to a motto during the American Revolution: "No King but King Jesus." The Founding Fathers passed the torch to us. It is our responsibility to not let it go out.

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#### Triumph through Temptation Matthew Chapter 4:1-11

The Temptation of Jesus is a familiar passage for many Christians. The meaning of this story is crucial in our own battle against sin. We need to see the close tie between

the temptations Jesus faced and the spiritual battles we all face. We need to understand there is a spiritual world. The Devil is real. The invisible spiritual world is just as real as the visible natural world. Angels, good and bad exist all around us.

We are involved in spiritual warfare,

the Kingdom of Christ against the Kingdom of Satan. Light and darkness are warring against each other. We must remember Satan is not omnipresent (present everywhere at the same time) like God is. So, remember when you are tempted; Satan is only a creature. Trusting in Christ for salvation, the battle intensifies. The evil one is persistently plotting to subtly entice you with sin and ultimately bring destruction to your soul. Don't be caught unaware.

The good news that Matthew teaches is that a new Man has come, a Man over whom Satan has no control. His Name is Jesus. In Matthew, we see Jesus is the new Man, who stepped into the universal human story. Jesus is the true Son, suffering through the particular Israelite story. Every sin we commit is a rejection of God our Father, the



One who knows what is best for us and is committed to providing it for us. It's crucial then, for us to see Jesus is the true Man and the true Son.

God **never** tempts us in the sense of enticing us to do evil. However, **nothing** happens in the universe apart farm the sovereignty of God. We are tested by God for good. Satan temps, he intends it for evil, but God uses these temptations to refine His children and to teach them His faithfulness. Consider Joseph in the Old Testament, who was sold into slavery and tempted in so many ways. God used these trials to bring about good for Joseph and his brothers (Genesis 50:20). Our sovereign Father uses even Satan's temptations to bring about good in your life. (Romans 8:28).

Jesus **could not** have sinned. Jesus is fully human. He was fully tempted. He is fully God and God **cannot** be tempted. Just as Jesus was tempted (as a human), so we are tempted with **self-gratification**. Satan works at the level of our wants. You desire food, and he tempts you toward in undisciplined overeating. Desire for sleep is tempted with apathy and laziness. Desire for sex is

tempted with lust, adultery, pornography and homosexuality. We must do what Jesus did. Jesus trusted in the all sufficient, all satisfying goodness of God the Father, Trust that God is good and realize any attempt to satisfy your wants apart from His wil,I ultimately leads not to delight but to destruction.

We are tempted with **self-protection**. We are tempted to question God's promises and manipulate His promises. We are tempted to question His plans for us, to doubt His love for us, and to complain to Him about the circumstances of our lives. Just as Jesus did, we are to rest in the shelter of the Father's unshakeable security.

We are tempted with **self-exaltation**. We are tempted to assert ourselves in the world while we rob God of His worship. Instead of simple, humble obedience to God in this world, in our pride we seek to attain what we want in the way we want to do it. Pride is the root of all rebellion. Jesus knows, as we all must learn, that the supreme duty of everyone and everything is to worship God. "Everyone who humbles himself before God will be exalted." (Matthew 23:12) The temptations Matthew records in this chapter are directly relevant to the battles we face every day. Self-gratification, self-protection and self-exaltation are always trying to allure us. But there is hope! God has given us His Spirit who led Jesus not only into the wilderness but through the wilderness unscathed. The same Spirit is alive in you. You cannot triumph over temptation, but Christ can. There is always a way of escape and it is Christ. Therefore, live in Him until one day He will reign over all as our sovereign King!
