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PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

For you have been **born again**, but not to a life that will quickly end. Your new life will last forever because it comes from the eternal, living word of God (1 Peter 1:23 NLT).

The 1904 Welsh Revival

The 1904 Welsh Revival began led by a 26 year old pastor, named of Evan Roberts. Previously, he was a

coal miner and a blacksmith. At work since age 13, he began praying for a Welsh Revival.

Later. he realized that he was called into ministry even though he had very little education. Often his church meetings had little preaching and had just prayer or the reading of scripture.

Roberts wrote: "I felt a living power pervading my bosom. It took my breath away and my legs trembled exceedingly. This living power became stronger and stronger as each one prayed, until I felt it would tear me apart. My whole bosom was a turmoil and if I had not prayed it would have burst ... I fell on my knees with my arms over the seat in front of me. My face was bathed in perspiration, and the tears flowed in streams. I cried out, 'Bend me, bend me!' It was God's commending love which bent me ... what a wave of peace flooded my bosom ... I was filled with compassion for those who must bend at the judgement, and I wept. Following that, the salvation of the human soul was solemnly impressed on me. I felt ablaze with the desire to go through the length and breadth of Wales to tell of the savior."

Things changed on

November 7, 1904, when the Moriah Chapel was filled to capacity for a prayer meeting that lasted until 3:00 a.m. A young girl, named Florrie Evans, who had only been a believer a few days, rose and with a trembling voice said simply, — "I love Jesus with all my heart." The other young people's hearts were melted at this, and thus began the revival where over 100,000 quickly came to Christ and became born again.

Evan Roberts message was simple: 1. Confess all known sin. 2. Deal with and get rid of anything `doubtful' in your life. 3. Be ready to obey the Holy Spirit instantly, and 4. confess Christ publicly.

The Welsh revival was a mighty invasion of the Holy Spirit with God's Kingdom radically manifested on earth with new behavior. People noticed these changes:

"The earnings of workmen, instead of being squandered on drink and vice, were now bringing great joy to their families. Outstanding debts were being paid by thousands of young converts. Restitution was the order of the day. The gambling and alcohol business lost their trade, and the theaters closed down from lack of patronage. Football during this time was forgotten by both players and fans, though nothing was mentioned from the pulpits about it.

The people had new lives and new interests. Political meetings were cancelled or abandoned. They seemed completely out of the question since nobody was interested. The political leaders from parliament in London abandoned themselves to the revival meetings. Judges were presented with white gloves because there were no cases to try the illegitimate birth rate was reduced by 44%. Mules in the mines had to be retrained, because the coal miners no longer used

> profanity when giving orders. The man-made barriers collapsed as believers

denominational completely and pastors worshiped their majestic Lord together."

It spread to the US. On Jan. 20, 1905, the Denver Post headline "Entire read, City Pauses for Prayer Even at the High Tide Business" of In Portland Oregon, 240 department stores

signed a covenant agreement to close their doors from 11:00 am - 2:00pm each day while their customers and employees attended prayer meetings. In Atlantic City, ministers reported that out of a population of 50,000, only 50 adults were left unconverted.

What was his secret? Roberts was willing to bow to God's Sovereign purpose for his life with Prayer (for months praying for 4 hours each day). His famous prayer was "Bend me, O Lord."

"Jesus' Miracles, Death and Resurrection" Matthew Chapters 8-25

Matthew shows us in Chapters 8-25 that Jesus has absolute authority in the world and deserves absolute allegiance from the world. This is good news, for this sin-stricken world is filled with sickness, struggles, disease, disasters and suffering; through Jesus' miracles, we see that He has authority over it all. So, once we understand this, it's only logical to conclude Jesus has authority over our lives as well. For those who know that they are weak and sinful, this is *really* good news.

In His miracles, Jesus places His healing touch on *all* people groups by cleansing the physically unclean, healing the ethnically outcast and restoring the culturally marginalized. We are all called to trust wholeheartedly in Jesus' authority, rest peacefully in His authority, submit completely, and rejoice gladly in His authority.

Jesus meets our greatest need by providing for the forgiveness of our sins and by defeating death on our behalf. Just as Jesus is shown to have authority over sickness and suffering. Matthew shows us Jesus has authority over the root of all suffering, which is sin (Adam being the first to experience

this). Jesus has absolute authority over *all* the world. Our ultimate need is not physical but spiritual. Forgiveness is God's greatest gift as it meets our greatest need.

Jesus says, "Come to me all who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest... For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." In our suffering, His burden doesn't seem "light". But just as the larger ox carries the yoke for the smaller weaker ox, when we are "yoked" to Jesus, He carries our burdens. It is only through dependence on Him and resting in His care that our burden is lifted, and we can find rest.

For three years here on earth, Jesus preached, taught, and healed. These last chapters of Matthew show us His glory as King. We see Jesus as a King who is divine, righteous, gentle, peaceful, and compassionate. He is the One who was prophesied to be the Messiah and the Savior. As the centerpiece of all history and the determinant of our eternity, the cross reveals God's

holiness, our wickedness and the humility of Jesus Christ.

The humility of Christ is evident in His substitution. Jesus dies our death. Jesus had absolutely no sin. Not even once did He disobey the Father. Yet, due to our sinfulness and our disobedience, we see Him die in our place. The cross was not just physical suffering, it was predominantly spiritual suffering. Our Father turned His back on His Son due to the sin He took on for us. Jesus was not a coward about to face Roman soldiers: He was a Savior about to experience the wrath of God. Jesus suffered our separation. Jesus' cry on the cross was that of physical agony, spiritual anguish, and relational alienation. Before the cross, we were afraid of God; because of the cross, we are now friends of God. Before the cross, we were cast out of God's presence; because of the cross, we are now invited into God's presence.

The cross in not the end! Jesus was placed in a borrowed tomb; another sign of His humility. Three

days later, He actually rose from the grave! When Matthew records for us the events in his Book, he is, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, making clams that change the world. If Jesus rose from the dead, we must accept everything He said for His authority is absolute. He has authority over life and death and over sin and

Satan. He has authority over you and me. He reigns supremely, but He also loves us deeply. Remember, the purpose of the resurrection is grounded in Christ's love for us. Our Father sent His Son to pay the price for our sin, and the resurrection lets us know that our hope of salvation is not some made-up story or myth. Believers should rejoice in Jesus' love demonstrated in both His cross and His resurrection.

Do you believe in the historical resurrection of Jesus? Romans 10:9 says that you must "confess with your mouth and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead in order to be saved." Scripture doesn't give us a list of things to do, boxes to check off, or rituals to follow. There is only truth to be believed. The other part of this verse says there is confession to be made, for even Satan believes in the resurrection.

To confess with your mouth is not about saying some magic words; rather, it's about a heart condition that says. "Yes, I believe Jesus died on the cross for my

sins and rose from the grave as my Savior, and my life belongs to Him as Lord." Where you spend eternity depends on this heart confession.

The last four verses of the book of Matthew are known as "The Great Commission". Here Jesus tells His disciples to. "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." Christ calls His followers to a costly mission that will involve suffering and opposition, but the sovereign care and protection of our Father are sufficient to sustain our faith. Jesus commissioned us as His disciples to go to go to great need and great danger. He warns we will be betrayed, hated, and persecuted, but the Father will take care of us. We are to confess Him publicly and love Him supremely. Jesus promises "surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." He promises if we take that risk of truly following Jesus, we will find the ultimate reward of eternal life in heaven.
