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Rev. Thomas Emery "The Meaning of the Ten Commandments" Exodus 20:1-20

Salem Presbyterian Church October 4, 2020

Most of us think of the Ten Commandments as a set of rules and are less familiar with their deeper significance. They are not just abstractions of ethical principles, for in the preceding chapter, the people had accepted an invitation into an exclusive relationship with God as a "kingdom of priests" to the rest of the world (19:5–6). The formation of Israel as the people of God began with their dramatic deliverance from bondage and continued in Exodus 20–23 with the giving of the Mt. Saini laws. The laws provided boundaries and instruction that protected and sustained their new-found freedom.

TEACHING POINTS

First. The Ten Commandments will make us holy as God is holy.

Second. We can have a perfect society if everyone practiced the Ten Commandments, but unfortunately no one can perfectly obey them.

Third. Jesus instilled grace into the Commandments and showed us how they point us to God's mercy.

THIS WEEK'S MEMORY PASSAGE

But I lavish unfailing love for a thousand generations on those who love me and obey my commands (Exodus 20:6 NLT).

ACTION POINT

The first four of the Ten Commandments address the relationship of humans to God, and the last six compactly articulate the absolute justice and goodness needed in all human interactions. Unfortunately, the values of modern society have reversed and inverted the commands. Coveting is our priority, and we expect sexual freedom, ignore extended family, and view God as irrelevant. When asked which commandment was the most significant, Jesus affirmed two fundamental principles that characterized the Law and the Prophets. He said, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength," and "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:28–34; Matt. 22:34–40; Luke 10:25–27). Jesus didn't set aside the Commandments, but He showed us what makes them work. With this awareness, why not strive to live as God has instructed us in His wisdom?
